

Find Natives, Rescue Natives, Nurture Natives,

and then Resettle Them!

Curious about the Georgia Native Plant Society (GNPS) Rescue Program? "Saving native plants from certain destruction not only perpetuates their lives, it educates and enriches ours." – Jeanne Reeves, founder of the GNPS rescue program.



This program is a very important part of

GNPS, and, the work is rewarding to everyone who participates. At every rescue, the diggers are collecting plants not only for their own gardens but to donate to schools, churches, a GNPS's restoration project, and private neighborhood gardens. Many of these plants are difficult to obtain, or simply unavailable, in the nursery trade.

Hundreds of the rescued plants are nurtured all year at the GNPS Propagation Nursery at Stone Mountain Park.

If not donated, these plants are sold at the Spring and Fall Plant Sales. There is more to rescues than just saving native plants. We are all teaching and learning every time we set feet on a rescue site. We build relationships with others who share a common interest in these wonderful plants along with the pollinators and wildlife who depend on them for their existence.

Never dig native plants on public property, or on private property without the permission of the owner. Join a GNPS Rescue and help us save the plants legally and ethically. Because these plants are on private property there are several Plant Rescue Rules: I) Must be a GNPS member (LWC has a corporate membership) 2) Rescued native plants cannot be sold privately! 3) can only enter the property with a GNPS Plant Rescue Leader

Fall is a perfect time to participate. Members will help you identify plants, show how to dig them up and give you tips for their care. Join GNPS members on a workday at the Propagation Nursery. Hope you come "do a Rescue" too! Contact GNPS member, Susan Hendricks or gnps.org for more information.

Lets Spruce Up Camp Creek Elementary Outdoor Classroom Chris Giddens, LWC member and parent of a Camp Creek student, has asked us to help Spruce Up their outdoor classroom. Conservation will partner with Art to provide new or gently used bird houses. We will partner with the GNPS to plant native shade plants. (There are plenty of native shade plants out there waiting to be rescued!) We also will help Chris Giddens find someone to build wooden picnic tables.



Following the Principles of Leave No Trace We usually have 40 plus members eating refreshments at our monthly meetings and that means I-2 large trash bags head to the dumpster at the end of the night. Conservation members would like us to institutionalize the Leave No Trace

Principles by using washable cups, glasses, plates and silverware. We will purchase these items, store them in bins and have them available at every monthly meeting. The diminishing weight of trash will be documented at the end of the meeting. Then, hopefully, the trash bags will be "hiked" off the property and home to our own trash cans! And yes, someone will get to wash the dishes. Yes, I would be glad to do that!

Some Facts from the June Issue of O.

An estimated 5.5 million Americans have Alzheimer's disease; about 5.3 million of them aged 65 or older.

Dementia is a more recent name for senility. Alzheimer's is a type of Dementia and is distinguished from other forms of dementia because it has two proteins in the brain beta-amyloid which forms plaque and tau which forms tangles.

Women account for nearly two thirds of those who have Alzheimer of people ages 71 and older.

Social connections can help build new brain cells and neural pathways.

According to the National Wellness Institute defines WELL-NESS as is an active process through which people become aware of, and make choices toward, a more successful existence.



By applying this Six Dimensional Model, a person becomes aware of the interconnectedness of each dimension and how they contribute to healthy living. This holistic model explains:

- How a person contributes to their environment and community, and how to build better living spaces and social networks
- The enrichment of life through work, and its interconnectedness to living and playing
- The development of belief systems, values, and creating a world-view
- The benefits of regular physical activity, healthy eating habits, strength and vitality as well as personal responsibility, self-care and when to seek medical attention

 Self-esteem, self-control, and determination as a sense of direction

Creative and stimulating mental activities, and sharing your gifts with others

Applying a wellness approach can be useful in nearly every human endeavor. As a pathway to optimal living, wellness is being applied to related fields, such as health promotion and holistic health, and has seen a growth in "helping professions" including counseling and medical arts and practices. The National Wellness Institute devised three questions that can help persons and organizations assess the degree to which wellness is incorporated into a particular approach or program:

- Does this help people achieve their full potential?
- Does this recognize and address the whole person(multidimensional approach)?
- Does this affirm and mobilize peoples' positive qualities and strengths?

Overview of 2017 Scholarship Awards: The LWC has awarded \$9,085 in scholarships to local students. Abigail Ivemeyer (Brookwood High School) and Leah Hall (Parkview High School) were the recipients of the two General \$2,500 Scholarship. The \$1,500 Teresa Hyke Foster Art Scholarship was awarded to Melisa Majdancic (Brookwood High School). Two \$1,000 scholarships were awarded Jessica Green and Lisa Fenwick who are attending Gwinnett Tech. Education has also sponsored three students from local high schools in the amount of \$195 each to attend HOBY (Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Workshop).



Education will be supporting Parkview High School and Trickum Middle School teams who have qualified to participate in the <u>Odyssey of the Mind World Finals</u> which will be held in Lansing, MI in June.

Approximately 850 teams from around the world will compete. The competition emphasizes creativity and teamwork and is the largest international creative problem-solving competition in the world.

The beginning of summer is the perfect time for enjoying the outdoors and bike riding with your family. Riding a bike is a great way to get kids outside and encourage them to stay active, but without precautions in place, it can be a cause of serious injury.

10 Tips for Safer Cycling*Wear your helmet. Follow this simple rule and you reduce your risk of serious injury by as much as 85%.

* Keep your head up and look ahead, not at the ground. You need to see what is coming up so you have time to react and maneuver.

*One person per bike. Riding with unsecured passengers puts you at risk for injury to yourself and others.

*Ride in single file with space between bikes.
*Ride on the right side of the road, never

against traffic.

*Plan ahead if you ride in a group. Agree on the route ahead of time. Have a plan on what

you will do if separated by traffic.
*Avoid busy roads and peak traffic times on

Before riding a night, ask someone to help

you check your visibility to motorists.

*Maintain the bikes in your household. Keep chains clean and lubricated and periodically inspect brake pads.
